From the Mayor's Corner



April and May is always a busy time at the City Building. A number of things take place. We prepare the proposed operating budget for the upcoming fiscal year and at the same time prepare for the outdoor spring, summer, and fall projects. This year is certainly no different. Council and I have recently met and reviewed the proposed budget for the upcoming fiscal year. In order to have a new budget adopted it requires two readings of an ordinance. This takes place at the May and June Council meetings. As we have done for the past eight or nine years, the proposed budget was prepared without any intention of an increase in the tax rate for the 2016-2017 Fiscal Year.

Our Public Works committee has been preparing our summer and fall street projects. For many years we have been replacing our worn out streets throughout the city. As we continue to follow our five year plan, this year we will be working on East Lakeside and a small portion of West Lakeside. East Lakeside will be a concrete street with the rolled curbs. In conjunction with our work, the Northern Kentucky Water District will be replacing water lines on East Lakeside.

Our new city website will be completed no later than June 30th. I encourage each of you to take a look at the site now and after the upgrade. You will find a wealth of information available to you. Our website address is www.cityoflakesidepark.com.

The plans for the construction of the sidewalk along Turkeyfoot Road are moving along. A conceptual drawing has been prepared and an initial meeting took place with the property owners along the east side of Turkeyfoot Road. The design drawings will be prepared once the "official" paperwork has been received from Frankfort. We wish to thank our own State Representative Diane St. Onge for all her hard work, and the Fiscal Court for agreeing to partner with the City of Lakeside Park on this project. This will complete a sidewalk on at least one side of Turkeyfoot Road from Dixie Highway to Richardson Road.

Our Recreation Director Grace Neltner never ceases to amaze me with the amount and type of fun programs she comes up with every year. Somehow she manages to come up with activities for all ages. She has also recently been coordinating more and more events with our friends in Fort Mitchell.

Our Police Department recently completed another successful Citizens Police Academy that was well attended.

Since our last Newsletter, the City Building is now open five days a week thanks to the addition of our Deputy City Clerk, Katie Hehman. The office hours are Monday – Friday from 8:00 a.m. till 4:30 p.m. Lunch is between 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m.

As we enter the spring and summer season, we remind you that our children are outside playing. Please use caution while driving through our neighborhoods. Also, please help keep our city beautiful. When mowing and trimming your lawns, please don't let your grass clippings remain on our streets and sidewalks. Have a safe and happy spring and summer season.

Public Works Update Andy Disken

We have put another mild winter behind us and it's time to start focusing on some road improvements in the upcoming months. Looking forward, the 2016 street projects will include East Lakeside Avenue: Dixie to Rock Crystal and West Lakeside Avenue: 106 to 122. The plan is to begin construction in early July and have all construction completed, weather permitting, by mid to late November. The Turkeyfoot Road Sidewalk project paperwork has been finalized and moved into the design stage. We anticipate beginning construction as early as Spring 2017. Finally, as previously mentioned, SD1 will be installing new larger sanitary pipes from Marlo Way, up Hudson Avenue and through a portion of Barleycorn's parking lot. This new sewer will help to alleviate overflows in the area. Currently the plan is to begin work later this year, sometime in the fall. We will do our best to keep residents updated on the progress and if time frames change we will communicate accordingly.

TORNADO SAFETY TIPS

Did you know that here in the USA, tornadoes have occurred in every month? Therefore, anytime is a good time to review tornado safety procedures. Each year about a thousand tornadoes touch down in the US. Only a small percentage actually strike occupied buildings, but every year people are killed or injured.

How to **prepare** for a tornado. The following are tips from the American Red Cross:

- ◆ During any storm, listen to local news or an NOAA weather radio to stay informed. Know your communities warning system. In our area we use storm sirens.
- ◆ Pick a safe room in your home where family members and pets may gather during a possible tornado. This should preferably be a basement, storm cellar or an interior room on the lowest floor with no windows.
- ◆ Practice periodic tornado drills in the home so that everyone knows what to do if a tornado is approaching.
- ◆ Prepare for high winds by removing diseased or damaged limbs from trees.
- ◆ Move or secure lawn furniture, trash cans, hanging plants or anything else that can be picked up by the wind and become a projectile.

Know the difference between a tornado watch and a tornado warning. If a tornado “watch” is issued for your area, it means that a tornado is possible. If a tornado “warning” is issued, it means that a tornado has actually been spotted or is strongly indicated on radar.

DANGER SIGNS

- ◆ Strong persistent rotation in cloud base, visible wall cloud, or isolated lowering of the base of a thunderstorm.
- ◆ Dark, often greenish clouds. Cloud of debris.
- ◆ Hail or heavy rain followed by either dead calm or a fast, intense wind shift.
- ◆ Loud continuous roar which does not fade in a few seconds like thunder.



What do we do during a tornado?

- ◆ The safest place to be is in an underground shelter or basement. If none of these are available, a small windowless interior room or hallway on the lowest level of a sturdy building is the safest alternative.
- ◆ Do not seek shelter in a hallway or bathroom of a mobile home. If you have access to a sturdy shelter or a vehicle, abandon your mobile home. Mobile homes are not safe during tornadoes or other severe winds.
- ◆ Do not wait until you see the tornado. If caught outdoors, seek shelter in a basement, shelter or sturdy building. If you cannot quickly walk to a shelter, immediately get into a vehicle, buckle your seat belt and try to drive to the closest sturdy shelter.

Remember to be prepared. It always helps to have an action plan in place during an emergency.

2nd Class of the Lakeside Park/Crestview Hills Police Authority Citizens Police Academy

I recently received the honor of participating in the Lakeside Park/Crestview Hills Police Authority Citizens Police Academy. This was the second session conducted by the Police Authority. This was a six week session held each Wednesday through the month of March and the first week in April.

All aspects of law enforcement were covered in this class. Topics covered included: Introduction to Policing, Police Training, Patrol Operations, Legal Issues, Investigations, Traffic Collisions, Forensic Science, Use of Force, Emergency Vehicle Operations, Community Policing, Crimes against People, and DUI and Drugs. The highlight of the class from my perspective was the DUI simulator goggles. We were given a set of goggles that simulated a .16 blood alcohol level and were asked to do field sobriety tests. This was a real eye opener to the effects of alcohol and driving.

I would like to thank Chief Chris Schutte, Captains Russ Leberecht and Brad Degenhardt, and the entire Lakeside Park Crestview Hills Police Department for their knowledge and professionalism in putting on this class, you truly are the best.
